Board Talk

One of our priorities has been to make primary care services more readily available for people in the Hutt Valley.

It is pleasing to see that many of the general practices in the region are now taking on new patients, which is a significant change from a couple of

To improve after hours care the Ministry of Health made additional funding available in 2009, which we used to establish a telephone nurse triage service.

This service enables people in the Hutt Valley to access medical advice at any time. This may include reassurance, suggesting medication such as paracetamol or advising the person to seek medical help either urgently or when the surgery opens in the

It's great to see that this service is well used. Over the period January 2010 to January 2011, the telephone nurse triage service received 30,631 calls.

Over 80% of phone callers needing care were able to wait to see a doctor in the morning after being given appropriate advice.

Less than 1% (288) of patients were referred to the emergency department and 3.5% (1077) of patients were referred to the after hours service.

The service is highly valued by the general practices.

If you or your child is unwell you should ring your general practice. It doesn't matter what time of the day or night you call. If it's after hours you are automatically transferred to the telephone nurse triage service.

Kids buzzing about oral health


Barnabee, the new oversized mascot of the Bee Healthy Regional Dental Service, has got kids buzzing about dental health.

The Bee Healthy Regional Dental Service started in March this year and is a new community based dental service for all children in the greater Wellington region aged between 0-18.

Campervan sized mobile dental units will visit every school in the region and children will receive their free annual examination at their own school. If they need any treatment, this will be done at one of the 11 brand new community based dental clinics.

While projects are happening all around the country, this is the only one that takes the initiative to make oral health more about general health and invest in health promotion and community engagement. The regional dental team have grasped the opportunity to make their service more relevant to today's kids, because they know full well the startling correlation between oral health and overall health.
