Free child dental care

Free basic dental care is available for all New Zealand children and teenagers up to 18 years of age. Enrol your child as early as possible into the Bee Healthy Regional Dental Service, as their first visit will usually be after their second birthday.

Bee Healthy started in March this year and replaces the previous school dental service. Three of the 11 new community dental clinics are now open, based in schools in Naenae, Cannons Creek and Stokes Valley. Titahi Bay, Johnsonville and Trentham clinics are due to open later this year, and five more will be built in 2012.

Many children will receive their dental care from a campervan sized mobile dental unit which will visit their school. Only those who need treatment will visit one of the new community clinics.

Measles, are you and your family protected?

Two young adults in the Wellington region have recently been confirmed as having measles.

Measles is a serious and infectious disease that is spread from person to person through the air by breathing, sneezing or coughing. As we have seen in Auckland, measles can spread rapidly. Measles can be prevented by immunisation, so it's important that you're immunised.

MMR (Measles, Mumps and Rubella) is a free vaccine and offers the best protection. Two doses are required to give maximum protection. These are usually given at around 15 months and four years, however you can receive the vaccine at any age after 12 months.

By getting immunised, you will not only be protecting yourself or your child, you'll also be helping stop the disease from spreading in our communities.

Measles symptoms include fever, cough, runny nose, sore red eyes and a skin rash.

patients access our services.
