

## Advice Note: Plagiocephaly

Dear GP,

Thank you for your referral with concerns about this patient's head shape. Based on your description and the photo provided, we believe it to be a benign positional plagiocephaly.

Plagiocephaly is also known as flattened head syndrome. It may be associated with torticollis. It is very common and occurs in 1 in 300 live births.

The characteristic features include:

- Infant's face may show head tilt and contra-lateral facial flattening
- Ear on the flattened side may be pushed forward when viewed from above
- There may be bulging on the side opposite from the flattening
- The forehead may be asymmetrical or uneven
- Normal head growth
- Normal development

## Management:

- Alternating infant's sleep positions (left and right occiput)
- Avoiding using the car seat when not in car
- Tummy time
- If associated torticollis referral to physiotherapy
